Campus Police Core Values

Integrity: We firmly adhere to the core values of the Department and the professional ethics in the Law Enforcement Code of Ethics. All members of the agency are expected to know and adhere to the highest ethical standards.

Professionalism: We continually strive to attain and enhance our knowledge, skills, and abilities in order to be able to provide higher standards of service to the university community.

Respect: We treat all members of the university community and the public at large with respect and dignity.

Service: We understand and adhere to the concept that espouses that there can be no greater gesture than to serve another human being. In that regard we uphold and consider it a great honor to be able to serve the university community in our quest to fulfill our mission.

Accountability: We hold ourselves accountable on a daily basis, and strive to always accept responsibility for our actions as law enforcement professionals, while meeting the expectations of those whom we serve.

Campus Security Authorities

The definition of “Campus Security Authority”, according to the federal law is as follows:

“An official of an institution who has significant responsibility for student and campus activities, including, but not limited to, student housing, student discipline and campus judicial proceedings.”

For example, a Dean of Resident Life who oversees student housing, a student center, or student extra curricular activities, has significant responsibility for student and campus activities. Similarly, a Director of Athletics, Team Coach and Faculty Advisor. A single teaching faculty member is unlikely to have significant responsibility for student and campus activities, except when serving as an advisor to a student group.

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***CAMPUS SECURITY POLICY AND
CAMPUS CRIME
STATISTICS ACT***

The Campus Security Act requires colleges and universities to:

Publish an annual report every year by October 1. That report must contain three years of data on campus crime, as well as certain campus security policy statements.

Disclose crime statistics for campuses, public areas immediately adjacent to or running through the university, and certain non-campus facilities and remote classrooms. The statistics must be gathered from campus police or security, local law enforcement, and other university officials who have “significant responsibility for student and campus activities.”

Provide “timely warning” notices of those crimes that have occurred and pose an on-going “threat to students and employees”, and Disclose in a public crime log “any crime that occurred on campus, or within the patrol jurisdiction of the campus police, or the campus security department and is reported to the campus police, or the campus security department.

The Howard University Police Department is primarily responsible for preparing and distributing the annual report. However, the department works with many other departments and agencies, both internally and externally to gather and report the information that is required by the Campus Security Act.

Unlawful use of this information to threaten, intimidate, harass, or injure a registered sex offender will not be tolerated and will be prosecuted to the full extent of the law.





The Howard University Police Department

The Howard University Police Department (HUPD) is the primary agency responsible for the safety and security of the students, faculty, staff, and visitors on the various campuses of the university. The Police Department's headquarters is located at 2244 10PthP Street, NW, 2nd Floor, Washington, D.C. 20059, the main telephone number is: (202) 806-1100. The Department operates on a twenty-four hour basis.

There is information portal to members of the University Community as well as the public located at 2225 Georgia Ave NW next to the Howard Bookstore.

The second substation for the police department is located within the Howard University Hospital which is located at 2041 Georgia Avenue. This substation provides a communications/dispatch function for the police officers assigned primarily to the hospital and the Medical campus of the university.

HUPD

Howard University Police Officers are either armed Special Police Officers or unarmed Security Officers. These Officers have been commissioned, or licensed, by the Washington, D.C. Metropolitan Police Department, Security Officers Management Branch, and operate under their guidelines, as well as local and Federal Laws. HUPD officers and investigators have developed and maintain extremely close working relations with the Metropolitan Police Department (MPD), other University Police Department's in the Washington Metropolitan region, as well as many other local, State, and Federal law enforcement agencies.

In February 2008, the Howard University Police Department under new leadership embarked on a mission to change the strategic direction and the operating philosophy of the agency to be more consistent with other university police department's nationwide. This change has led to a re-engineering process that is designed to update the policies, procedures, practices, and organizational structure of the organization in order to make it more efficient and effective. The "best practices" of university policing nationwide are being adopted and integrated into the fabric and culture of the HUPD. The goal of this re-engineering process is to make the HUPD one of the premier, nationally accredited university police departments in the United States, providing the best safety and security services for its students, faculty, staff, and visitors.



The police department's structure has been recently re-organized to group all functions into two bureaus.



The Field Services Bureau (FSB) is comprised of the following sections: Campus Patrol and Security Services, Howard University Hospital Patrol and Security Services, and the Physical Security and Communications Services.

The Support Services Bureau (SSB) is comprised of the following sections: Administrative Services, Special Operations Services, Training and Education Services, and the Criminal Investigations and Crime Analysis Services section. This reconfiguration structure provides a better structure for the delivery of more efficient and effective services for our customers. Another recent change has been the incorporation of a vision statement and a mission statement, as well as a core set of values adopted by the members of the police department.

Policy Concerning Reporting Criminal Actions or Emergencies

The University Police Officers are dispatched immediately when a report of a crime or incident is received. Officers prepare and submit reports after interviewing complainants. When necessary, investigative and support services are made available. When a report involves a felony (e.g., rape, armed robbery, etc.) UPD automatically notifies MPD for assistance and both respond. In less serious situations, MPD is kept informed of campus crimes during periodic meetings.



PROCEDURES FOR REPORTING SEX OFFENSES

An individual who claims to be a victim of a sexual offense may notify any Howard University administrator or the Howard University Police Department. Howard University and HUPD encourage the reporting of all crimes. An administrator shall immediately direct that individual to a Dean or the UPD. The Dean or UPD personnel shall immediately inform the individual claiming to be a victim of a sexual offense of:

- (1) The victim's right to notify the appropriate law enforcement authorities, including the local police.
- (2) The victim's right to file criminal charges with the appropriate law enforcement authorities.
- (3) The importance of preserving evidence necessary to the proof of a criminal sexual offense and prompt notification of law enforcement authorities.
- (4) The name and location of the nearest hospitals equipped with the sexual assault evidence collection kit.



Examples of Sexual Harassment

The following examples are illustrative of conduct that, if proven, would be considered by the University to establish sexual harassment in either an employment or an academic setting:

- a. Unsolicited, unwelcome flirtations, advances, and/or propositions of a sexual nature;
- b. Insults, jokes, or anecdotes that belittle or demean an individual or group's sexuality or gender



Examples of Sexual Harassment continued

- c. Unwelcome sexually-oriented gestures, verbal expressions, or comments of a sexual nature about an individual's body, clothing, or sexual experience;
- d. Inappropriate displays of sexually suggestive objects or pictures;

UNIVERSITY POLICY CONCERNING SEXUAL OFFENSES

The University will assist any victim of sexual offense in notifying local law enforcement authorities and in securing appropriate medical attention, including transportation to the nearest hospital.

Survivors of sexual assault should give strong consideration to reporting the assault. Reporting an assault to the Howard University Police Department(HUPD) or other law enforcement or campus security authorities does not require filing criminal charges, but it does allow all support systems to be put in place for the survivor.

Reporting is best done as soon as possible after the assault, but it may be done at any time. Students can make their report to any Campus Security Authority, including, but not limited to, University

The University will notify the victim of the options for such changes and make changes if they are reasonably available. To make a request, students should contact the Dean for Special Student Services on (202) 238-2420. If requested by the survivor, and if reasonably available, the University will assist the survivor in changing his/her academic or living situation after the alleged assault. Members who choose to notify Police should be aware of the importance of the immediacy of reporting the incident and the importance of preserving physical evidence at the assault scene as well as on the person assaulted. The gathering of physical evidence can provide important.

Rights of the Complaining Party

Any member of the University Community who believes that he or she has been subjected to sexual harassment in violation of University Policy is urged to promptly pursue the matter and to file a complaint. The complaining party will not be reprimanded, retaliated against, or discriminated against in any way for initiating an inquiry or complaint in good faith. Howard University and HUPD encourages the reporting of all crimes.

Rights of the Alleged Subject

A person against whom a complaint is lodged shall be presumed innocent of that charge unless and until there is a final administrative finding of culpability or a stipulated admission to the charge by that person.

Policy on Sexual Offense Violations

Individuals found to have committed a sexual offense in violation of the Howard University policy will be subject to disciplinary action in accordance with University procedures up to and including dismissal from employment or from such academic or other University-sponsored program in which such individuals participates, and / or expulsion from the University. Any individual who learns of an alleged incident of a sexual offense shall inform the Vice President for Human Capital Management (202) 806-5770 or Howard University Police Department (202) 806-1100, who shall be responsible for contacting the alleged victim. The alleged victim will also be informed of his or her right to file a formal complaint and offered assistance in initiating a complaint.

Timely Warning and Safety Alerts Policy

The Campus Crime Alert (“Alert”) is provided to give students, faculty and staff timely notification of crimes that may present a threat to the University Community and to heighten safety awareness. In general, criminal suspects are unknown to the victims. However, in the instance of a violent crime occurring between two individuals who know each other, University Police will look at each instance to determine if the suspect poses a continued threat to the Howard Community and issue a warning when necessary. The Alert also presents information that may lead to arrest and conviction of the offender when violent crimes against persons or major crimes against property have been reported to the police.

Timely Warnings and Safety Alerts are announced and transmitted through the Howard University Police Department website www.howard.edu/services/campuspolice/, the Office of University Communications using email .

Reporting Crimes and Emergencies

Howard University and HUPD encourage the reporting of all crimes. You may report any suspected criminal activity and/or other emergencies directly to CPD by dialing extension 6-7777 from any campus telephone. When dialing from outside telephones, you may reach CPD by dialing (202) 806-7777 or 806-1100.

Special Safety Tips

Special safety tips are announced and transmitted through the University's Website throughout the school year with particular emphasis on any upcoming holidays or college recess when students will be away from their residence halls for an extended period of time.

Rape Aggression Defense (RAD) Classes

RAD classes for female students are provided by the HU Police Department. This comprehensive course begins with awareness,





prevention, risk reduction and avoidance. This class then progresses to the basics of hands-on defense training. Certified RAD instructors teach this course shortly after registration and upon special request.

Crime Prevention Outreach

Crime Prevention Outreach is a program that ensures the Department disseminates crime prevention pamphlets and other literature to students at safety campaigns. These sessions are held during the Spring and Fall registration and orientation periods and at seminars and workshops held in residence halls and dormitories throughout the year.

The Escort Service

The Campus Police Department and Student Services jointly provide an Escort Service to students, faculty and staff when they have to travel alone on campus in isolated areas after dark, where there is low activity on campus,

or anytime someone requests this service who is concerned for their personal safety. Refer to the back cover for the appropriate telephone numbers.

DEFINITIONS OF REPORTABLE CRIMES

Murder and Non-negligent Manslaughter. The willful (non-negligent) killing of one human being by another.

Negligent Manslaughter. The killing of another person through gross negligence.

Sex Offenses-Forcible. Any sexual act directed against another person, forcibly and/or against that person's will; or not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent.

Forcible Rape. The carnal knowledge of a person, forcibly and/or against that person's will; or not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity (or because of his/her youth).

Forcible Sodomy. Oral or anal sexual intercourse with another person, forcibly and/or against that person's will; or not forcibly against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her youth or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity.

Sexual Assault with an Object. The use of an object or instrument to unlawfully penetrate, however slightly, the genital or anal opening of the body of another person, forcibly and/or against that person's will; or not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her youth or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity.

Forcible Fondling. The touching of the private body parts of another person for the purpose of sexual gratification, forcibly and/or against that person's will; or, not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her youth or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental incapacity.



Liquor Law Violations. The violation of laws or ordinances prohibiting: the manufacture, sale, transporting, furnishing, possessing of intoxicating liquor; maintaining unlawful drinking places; bootlegging; operating a still; furnishing *liquor to* a minor or intemperate person; using a vehicle for illegal transportation of liquor; drinking on a train or public conveyance; and all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned activities. (Drunkenness and driving under the influence are not included in this definition.)



Drug Abuse Violations. Violations of state and local laws relating to the unlawful possession, sale, use, growing, manufacturing, and making of narcotic drugs. The relevant substances include: opium or cocaine and their derivatives (morphine, heroin, codeine); marijuana; synthetic narcotics (Demerol, Methadone); and dangerous non-narcotic drugs (Barbituates, Benzedrine).

Weapon Law Violations. The violation of laws or ordinances dealing with weapon offenses, regulatory in nature, such as: manufacture, sale, or possession of deadly weapons; carrying deadly weapons, concealed or openly; furnishing deadly weapons to minors; aliens possessing deadly weapons; and all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned acts.



Sex Offenses, non-forcible. Unlawful, non-forcible sexual intercourse.

Incest. Non-forcible sexual intercourse between persons who are related to each other within the degrees wherein marriage is prohibited by law.

Statutory Rape. Non-forcible sexual intercourse with a person who is under the statutory age of consent.

Robbery. The taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.

Burglary. The unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or theft. For reporting purposes this definition includes: unlawful entry with intent to commit a larceny or felony, breaking and entering with intent to commit a larceny, housebreaking, safecracking, and all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned acts.

Aggravated Assault. An unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault usually is accompanied by the use of a weapon or by a means likely to produce death or great bodily harm. (It is not necessary that injury result from an aggravated assault when a gun, knife, or other weapon is used that could and probably would result in serious personal injury if the crime were successfully completed.)

Aggravated Assault continued. (It is not necessary that injury result from an aggravated assault when a gun, knife, or other weapon is used that could and probably would result in serious personal injury if the crime were successfully completed.)

Motor Vehicle Theft. The theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle. (Classify as motor vehicle theft all cases where automobiles are taken by persons not having lawful access even though the vehicles are later abandoned, including joyriding.)

Arson. Any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property of another, etc.

General University Policy Concerning Alcohol

In compliance with District of Columbia law, persons of legal drinking age are 21. An extensive list of Howard Policy concerning can be found in the Student H Book printed by office of Student Activities at (202)-806-7000.

1. The sale, service or consumption of alcoholic beverages is not permitted in classrooms and/or laboratories.
2. Consumption of alcoholic beverages in the residence halls must be in accordance with the District of Columbia laws pertaining to the purchase and consumption of alcoholic beverages and will not be permitted in the public or common areas of the buildings.
3. Student organizations affiliated with schools and colleges may serve alcoholic beverages at approved on-campus functions conducted within their respective building with the approval of the Academic Dean of the School or College and the Director of Student Activities. The serving and consumption of alcoholic beverages is restricted to the designated areas within the building where the respective school or college is housed..

University Policy concerning Illegal Drugs and controlled Substances

The University has a “zero” tolerance policy on the improper use of controlled substances that expressly prohibits:

The illegal possession, use, distribution, and/or sale of a controlled substance. The illegal possession, use, distribution and/or sale of drug paraphernalia. Aiding or abetting the illegal possession, use, sale, or distribution of controlled substances or drug paraphernalia.



Current Assessments of Possible Health Risks Associated with Drug Use/Abuse.

Type of drug (and generic effects) Effects	Name	Possible
Stimulants speed up action of the central nervous system.	Amphetamines (speed, uppers, pep pills, bennies)	Hallucinations may occur. Tolerance, psychological and sometimes physical dependence can develop. Continued high doses can cause heart problems, malnutrition, and death.
	Cocaine (coke, snow, crack, rock – legally classified as a narcotic)	Confusion, depression, and hallucinations may occur. Tolerance and physical dependence can develop. Effects are unpredictable – convulsions, coma, and death are possible. Smoking may cause lesions in lungs.

Policy on Crime Prevention Outreach



Howard University Police Department provides an ongoing program, in which crime prevention information is disseminated to Students, Staff, and Faculty focusing on Safety Presentations. These sessions are held during the Spring and Fall registration specifically, during incoming Freshman Orientation period. There is also an Annual Safety Awareness Fair, usually held in October. Safety presentations outline ways to maintain Personal Safety, Office Safety, and Residence Hall security. Students, Faculty, and Staff are informed about crime on-campus and in surrounding neighborhoods. New employees are informed during their orientation as well.

A common theme of all Safety Awareness and Crime Prevention Programs is to encourage Students, Faculty, and Staff to be aware of their responsibility for their own security and the security of others. In addition to seminars, information is disseminated to the HU Community through crime prevention awareness packets, security alert flyers, displays, and articles and advertisements in student newspapers.

Periodically during the academic year the HUPD, in cooperation with other University organizations and departments, present crime prevention awareness sessions on sexual assault (rape and acquaintance rape), date rape drugs, theft, and vandalism, as well as educational sessions on personal safety and residence hall security. Crime Prevention Programs and Sexual Assault Prevention Programs are offered on a continual basis. To schedule safety presentations please call 202- 806-1088.

Policy Statement Addressing Counselors

As a result of the negotiated rulemaking process which followed the signing into law, the 1998 amendments to 20 U.S.C. Section 1092 (f), clarification was given to those considered to be campus security authorities. Campus “Pastoral Counselors” and Campus “Professional Counselors”, when acting as such, are not considered to be a security authority and are not required to report crimes for inclusion into the annual disclosure of crime statistics. As a matter of policy, they are encouraged; if and when they deem it appropriate, to inform persons being counseled of the procedures to report crimes on a voluntary basis for inclusion into the annual crime statistics.

The rulemaking committee defines counselors as:



Pastoral Counselor

An employee of an institution who is associated with a religious order or denomination, recognized by that religious order or denomination as someone who provides confidential counseling and who is functioning within the scope of that recognition as a pastoral counselor.

Professional Counselor

An employee of an institution whose official responsibilities include providing psychological counseling to members of the institution’s community and who is functioning within the scope of his or her license or certification.

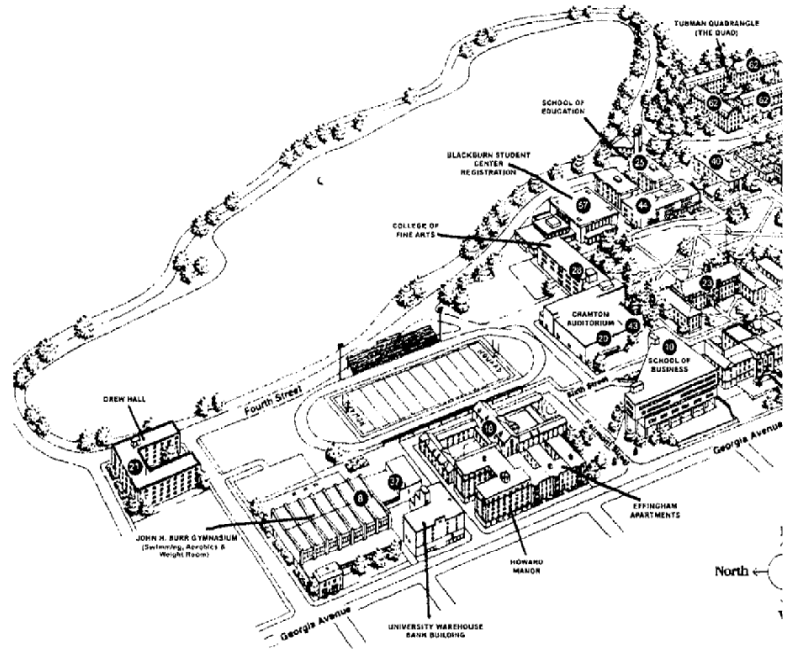

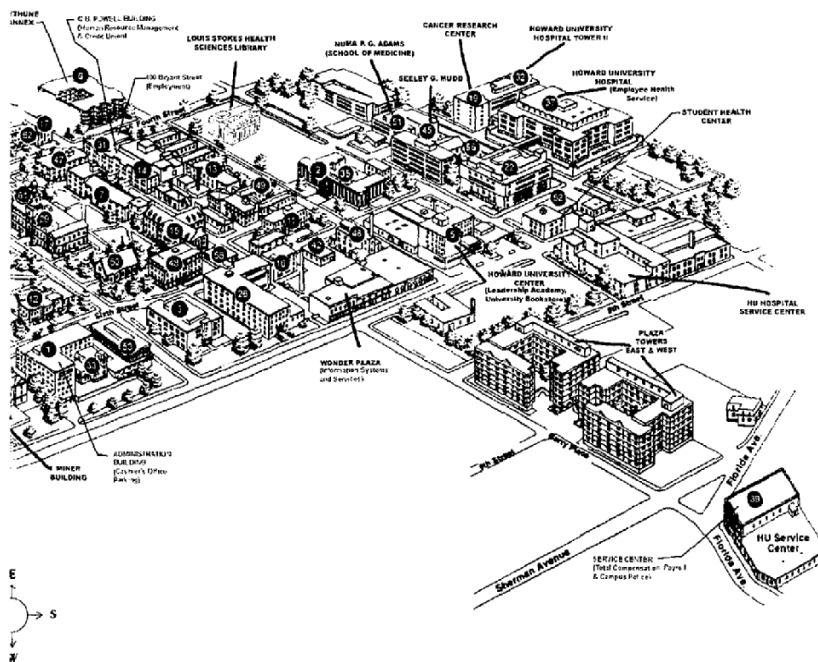
